What's happening with children's ministries in mainline Protestant churches?

I'm glad you asked! For as long as I can remember, I've been passionate about children's ministries – both engaging in them and paying close attention to their changing shape. Long before the pandemic, major shifts in our culture impacted church participation. In particular, when religious affiliation was no longer a cultural expectation (circa 60 years ago in the 1960's), most mainline Protestant congregations experienced a slow but steady decline in numbers. While some mainline leaders grasped new visions and practices to reach the next generation, the majority just kept insisting upon their traditional ways. And then came the pandemic. While devasting in so many ways, the inability to gather indoors, led some of our churches to look outward, beyond the church's doors; they adapted their fledgling Sunday School to regular outdoor and online gatherings, thereby inviting and engaging many families in their community. Now, emerging from the pandemic, the churches that lost their last bit of younger generations are looking anew at their children's ministries. Maybe it goes without saying, but I'll say it anyway: engaging meaningful children's ministries means understanding parents and rethinking how to care for them in meaningful, faith-filled ways. With that in mind, maybe the old models no longer fit today's generation of parents. While no one article can give all the answers, some can and do ask the right questions; below is an article that asks a few good questions!

So, Your Church Wants More Young Families?

When I help churches through our Church Vitality Assessment, there is one comment that I see again and again.

"We need more young families."

I also hear "We need younger folks to serve in leadership roles," and "We are declining because of a lack of young families, children, and youth." I know that this challenge is top of mind for so many of you out there trying to live into God's calling in a time of national church decline. It can be hard when you believe a healthy church is generationally diverse and you look out on Sunday mornings and see only gray hair. While I believe that God has a calling for every church, no matter what color your hair or what your age bracket, I completely understand the anxiety caused by seeing your beloved congregation age.

However, when I read these statements by members of churches that are already struggling to minister to their existing members, much less their community, I have to wonder if they actually know any young families. You see, the young families I know in my networks of friends and relations are struggling. They are stretched so thin they are near the breaking point.

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A study by researchers at Ohio State University shows that parental burnout may be at an all-time high these days. Some of this increase is due to the pandemic, but studies as far back as 2017 cite rising burnout rates, simply because of the ever-increasing demands of modern parenting. As many as 66% of parents experienced symptoms of parental burnout during 2021. Mothers were particularly affected along with parents of children who have special needs. Burnout like this is strongly associated with parental depression, anxiety, and substance abuse. Parents are more isolated than ever from community and family support, feeling like they have to do everything on their own. They feel torn between doing a good job at work and being a good parent. Simply put, these parents need help.

Yet the churches I hear saying the most about young families are also saying that they are tired and wanting to pass the baton of work and leadership to a new generation. They see young families as a source of help to them as they age, without considering the great needs of any family with school-age children right now. Trust me when I say, these young families that I know do not have the capacity to take on one new thing. Some of my friends and acquaintances with young children are or have been involved with churches, and too often I hear stories of them being offered no help and support at all, while being asked to serve in leadership year after year without a break. Can you blame them for taking church off the "to-do" list?

If there was one question I would ask any church that wants more young families, it would be this:

Why do you want them?

I might go on to ask:

Do you want them simply to help you do your work? Or are you called to minister to them?

If the answer is the latter (and I truly hope it is), I invite you to first consider what the families in your neighborhood actually need. And the best way to do that is to ask them. When was the last time you reached out to your neighbors to simply ask: What do you need? And how can we help?

Of course, this doesn't only apply to young families, these are great questions to ask all of our neighbors if we seek to love them as ourselves. The key here is seeing your neighbors as more than fodder for the survival of your church. It means seeing each and every one of them as beloved children of God. It means loving your neighbors, even when their needs far outweigh anything they can offer in time or service.

This is the great commandment. How will you live into it today?

At First Church Woodbridge we have launched an experiment: Forest Vandeflor and I are creating monthly events for families with children in the hopes of getting to know them and ministering to them. We're off to a great start. *Now I have a question for you: would you like to be part of it?* We need a team of people to take on a variety of small tasks. If you have just two hours (in any given month), we have a spot for you! Please reach out to me – in-person, by phone, or by email – if you want to be part of this team-experiment. Excited!

FCCW CHURCH COUNCIL REPORT

NOVEMBER 2022

The FCCW Church Council met, with a quorum present on Monday, October 3, 2022, in the Board Room.

After the opening prayer given by Rev. Murtha, she reported that Trustees are continuing to review and discuss Robert Sheiman's report regarding alternative, future uses of the Parish House. He is presently obtaining cost estimates on upgrading the building to make it marketable for rental uses as well as installation of air conditioning to make it a year-round use facility. While all reports are presently being presented to and approved by Trustees, all final decisions, regarding refurbishing and repurposing, will be made by members at a congregational meeting. Rev. Murtha also provided a preliminary overview of the search process for a settled full or part-time minister. She will make a presentation at the October 16th "steps" session. She also reported that The Rev. Michael Ciba, UCC Southern New England Conference, has graciously accepted an invitation by Rev. Murtha to speak with us at a special after church session on October 30th regarding the value of and role played by the conference in the search process.

The Treasurer's detailed report indicated that pledges are down somewhat for August and to some degree, year to date. Council discussed ideas regarding contacting all members with friendly reminders to fulfill their pledges, as we near the end of our fiscal year. Expenses for August exceeded income. Trustees reported on the Sheiman report being reviewed and discussed. They also approved an increase in the Rev. Murtha's hours from 25 to 32 per week, at the request of the Search & Support Committee. This is due to the fact that she has been devoting more time than originally planned to fulfill and meet our needs as we move forward with plans for repurposing.

The creation of an Ad Hoc Stewardship Committee was voted on and approved for 2022-23. This committee will review the status of pledges to date and plan and promote the pledge campaign for 2023. Individual members will be contacted to assist with both efforts. The Personnel Committee reported that Forest Vandeflor has begun working on a Children's Ministry program under Rev. Murtha's direction and guidance. This is much needed and long discussed effort to provide religious education programing for the children of our membership and community. A new FCCW staff Covid policy formulated by Rev. Murtha with input from members has been developed and approved by Trustees. Deacons reported that there will be an Interfaith Service held at our church on Monday, November 21, with a reception coordinated by FCCW to follow. Volunteers needed! A new microphone system for the Meetinghouse which has been approved by Trustees will be reviewed for a planned installation, in cooperation with the Technical Committee. Also, Deacon's will be contacting former Deacons to ask if they would again become members, as their membership has become limited.

A written Christian Service report was presented as to organizations to which funding is being granted and the overall criteria used by CS in making decisions regarding why organizations were given donations. The Music Committee reported that Nenad, FCCW organist, will again give a concert in November. The possibility of sponsoring a Christmas Carol Sing was discussed. Maybe it could be held outdoors on the Green with a fire pit, which the Boy Scout Troop would provide. More discussion is needed, with a final decision in November. Nominations for new members of the Nominating Committee must be made soon in order for presentation at the January Congregational meeting. The Bylaws Committee reported that while the new Bylaws have been approved and will soon be distributed, there is already a call for reviewing those sections dealing with the audit and the preliminary budget time frame. These matters will soon be reviewed. Technical Committee reported that two new air purifiers have been purchased for installation in the two staff offices in the Parish House. Wi-Fi strength in our facilities could be better and is being investigated presently.

Search & Support reviewed Rev. Murtha's request for increased hours and approved them with a recommendation to Trustees. The Boy Scout report noted that over \$1000 had been cleared by their latest garden sale. They provided support and assistance to the church at the Pie ala Mode event and will be working on Woodbridge's food drive. They will also be working in cooperation with Hamden Scouts in a Christmas tree sale in Hamden.

When we return to Standard Time in November, all Council Meetings will be conducted at mid-day meeting times. The new schedule will begin in November and last until March 2023. The next Council meeting will be held at 12:30 PM, November 7, 2022, in the Parish House Board Room.

And consider the bench's physical impact. The life expectancy of granite is reportedly 1,500 years!

Troop 907 Update - November 2022

BSA Scout Troop 907, sponsored by the Woodbridge First Church of Christ, is a regional troop and continues with significant activity year-round. The troop offers fellowship in life and scouting. Scouting is an ongoing adventure that is youth-led and overseen by trained scout leaders. Troop 907, being an active outdoor unit, is planning adventures this fall and winter including canoeing on the Connecticut River.

Fall is the season of harvest, beauty and fellowship all over our great country. The season starts with Labor Day and ends with the Thanksgiving through Christmas year-end holiday season. In scouting this is no different, but fellowship in scouting includes connecting to community and supporting those less fortunate. This is why the fall has a heavy community service emphasis in Troop 907. The fall season started in September with volunteering at the New Haven Labor Day Road Race. In October the troop supported the Woodbridge Road Race & First Church, our charter organization's pie-ala-mode sale.

SANCTUARY RESTORATION UPDATE. OCTOBER 25, 2022

The State Historic Preservation Office application for 50% matching funding for the completion of the sanctuary became available today and must be completed and submitted by December 2, 2022. The John Canning Company will complete the decorative work in the apse and on the walls and will oversee the subcontractors. The scope of work and the budget negotiations with Canning was concluded this week and it was brought to the trustees meeting where it was given final approval.



Even though a formal sanctuary fund-raising campaign will not begin until the SHPO grant is secured, the Sanctuary Fund continues to accept donations. If donating to the Sanctuary Fund in 2022 (versus 2023) is advantageous to your tax situation, please consider contributing before the end of this year. A \$1 for \$1 match for the next \$9K donated to the Fund is currently available - which will double the impact of any gift (large or small).
